HURRICANE HARVEY CLEAN-UP BUCKETS

As Hurricane Harvey was finally leaving the Texas area, Priscilla Self, ISC Disaster Coordinator, Chris Cox, President/CEO and Rev. Mike Southcombe, Board Chairperson of Hoyleton Youth and Family Services, and the ISC Highland office staff were collaborating on how the Illinois South Conference and Hoyleton Youth & Family Services could respond.

On September 21, volunteers gathered at St. John Evangelical UCC in Collinsville to assemble 93 CWS Clean-Up Buckets for Hurricane Harvey Disaster Response. At the same time, ISC church members dropped off completed Clean-Up Buckets and extra supplies from their congregations. By 2 pm, 469 Clean-Up buckets and two pallets of extra cleaning supplies were loaded onto the Stock Transport truck. These items would be delivered to St. Paul UCC in Corpus Christi, Texas to be distributed to Harvey victims in that area including Rockport and Port Aransas.

A Letter from UCC Disaster Relief about Harvey & Irma

Dear Friends,

Please continue to check the website as the team in Cleveland has been working hard to keep things fresh. We continue to do our best to field calls and emails as well as maintain as much situational awareness on the various disasters our country and world are facing so that we can respond in appropriate impactful ways. Please continue to keep everyone in prayer and share our deepest appreciation and sincere gratitude with those that are donating, praying and serving. Their support IS making a difference in the lives of families. Thank You!

We are ready for volunteers to support Irma (and Matthew) recovery work in Volusia County, FL.

- We have partnered with the Fuller Center Disaster Rebuilders in TX to support muck and gut work. Information will soon be posted at www.ucc.org/disaster volunteer opportunities page.
- One of our Disaster Recovery Support Team members is in TX working with FEMA to provide additional support for Long Term Recovery Group (LTRG) development.
- We have provided a solidarity grant to a Global Ministries partner in working in Mexico since the earthquake.
- We are staying in close contact with our network connections to Puerto Rico but have received very little
 information directly from the island due to lack of power and compromised communications infrastructure.
 In addition, the Conference Ministers, Conference Disaster Coordinators, and UCC national staff are providing
 support and coordination around the responses.

Hurricane Harvey

- One UCC congregation in Texas had flood damage and is receiving support
- \$2,000 solidarity/emergency grant was given to St. Paul UCC in Corpus Christi, TX for emergency food distribution in nearby Port Aransas
- Training and support provided by national staff for local UCC pastors resourcing their communities with information on how to access available assistance through the Red Cross, local, state, and national sources
- Long-term recovery plans are being created and launched

Hurricane Irma

- At least 2 UCC congregations in Florida lost steeples in Hurricane Irma and are receiving support
- \$1,500 solidarity/emergency grant to the Miami Shores Community Church, UCC which is supporting the purchase of a generator, fuel, gas stoves for community cooking, and purchasing and distributing ice
- \$10,000 to IMA World Health for their proactive program to prevent cholera and malnutrition in Haiti in the wake of Hurricane Irma, and to treat any instances that occur
- \$10,000 to Global Ministries partners in Cuba with the distribution of WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene products and programs), temporary shelter, non-food emergency items like blankets or medicine, help around food security (damaged crops), recovery/livelihoods, and psycho-social support
- \$10,000 to Church World Service in Northern Haiti where homes that were weakened by Hurricane Matthew in 2016 have now sustained additional damage

FINDING A QUICK FIX!!

A man ran an ad for a system guaranteed to cut your bills in half. He claimed his system required no seminars, no training, and no legal fees. It was quick and easy solution. He promised that for \$29.99 any and every bill could be cut in half.

Unfortunately, people were disillusioned when they received their kit in the mail. In fact, there were so many complaints that the authorities did an investigation and they discovered the kit only contained one thing. What was the one thing the kit contained?? A pair of scissors.

Yes, for \$29.99 plus postage and handling the man would send people something that would cut their bills in half, but not in the way they wanted. Due to the pressure from dissatisfied customers, authorities eventually charged the man with mail fraud.

Yet, here is what I really want to know. Why did so many people send \$29.99 plus postage and handling without any knowledge or information about what he was

selling except empty promises? Actually, I think I know the answer. Honestly, I see it all too often in the Church.

Too often out of frustration, out of desperation, or out of fear of not knowing where else to turn, we talk ourselves into looking for a quick fix. We convince ourselves that there must be an easy answer. We sell ourselves on the notion that there must be a simple solution. We quickly buy into the idea that there must be a plan of action that will immediately solve all of our problems in one easy step.

The most unfortunate thing is that when we buy into immediate actions to solve complex situations, we often cut God out of the equation all together. When we do not allow ourselves the time and space to seek God's guidance, wisdom, and direction, we can run the risk of making hasty decisions that are not only short sighted, but can be downright un-Christ like and will eventually cause more problems and pain in the end.

The truth is the promise of a quick fix is always an empty promise. Complex problems do not arise immediately, and they cannot be solved immediately. I believe the best practice and the most faithful practice in facing such problems is to first slow down, breathe, and invite the presence of God into the decision process.

The invitation of the divine will often mean the invitation for all of us to take a step back and be willing to wait until we are fully ready to listen to one another and ready to listen to the still speaking voice of God in our midst. Such resting

and waiting upon the divine as well as the ability to listen to one another and to God at the deepest level enables God to speak to us and transform our minds, hearts, and spirits to make decisions that are more faithful.

The next time we are tempted to act too quickly, too hastily in reaction to difficult situations that arise, I pray that we will not cut God out of our discernment and decision processes. For the promise of which the Apostle Paul reminded the churches in Corinth is still true for us today. It is not an empty promise.

"And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." -Philippians 4:7





Back Bay Mission Speaks about Disaster Relief

Over the last several weeks, we at Back Bay Mission have watched as our friends and neighbors have been pummeled by Hurricanes Harvey and Irma. These include people in Texas and Florida, as well as Louisiana, the Bahamas, Puerto Rico, Haiti, and other parts of the United States, the Caribbean, and Latin America. Our hearts are broken by the heavy losses that people have suffered, and we are praying for everyone who has been affected by these storms.

As residents of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, a place that was all but forgotten in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, we know first-hand that every natural disaster is also a human disaster. People have and will lose their savings, their homes, their possessions, their jobs, and their lives. And the poor and marginalized will bear the

costs of these storms disproportionately. Not just today but in the years to come.

We also know that recovery time is not measured in weeks or months. It is measured in years. The people and communities affected by these hurricanes need our care. Harvey and Irma are tests of our nation's willingness to provide long-term support for people impacted by a communal disaster.

At Back Bay Mission, we stand in solidarity with our friends and neighbors in the United States, the Caribbean, Latin America, and anywhere else that must endure disasters like Harvey and Irma. We stand in solidarity especially with the poor, marginalized, and forgotten... the people who won't be seen on news broadcasts or mentioned in reports, but who will suffer the harshest effects of these storms.
