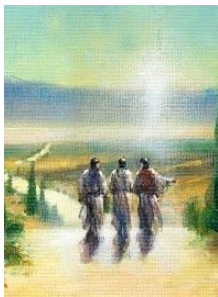

Diverse Minds, Covenant Hearts, Made One in the Body of Christ



Several years ago, as a parish pastor, I went to the hospital to visit with a family as they were waiting for their loved one to come out of surgery. We talked for a while and then one of the sons, who is not a member of the church I was serving but someone I had met several times before, came up and starting talking about the church. He then said to another sibling that he was always so impressed by how the minister of the church was so good at visiting her members, and so he was surprised that she was not there, but she would probably be coming soon.

The rest of the family looked uncomfortable and I said, "Oh who are you talking about?" The son's response was, "The minister at my mom's church." To which I said, "Oh, that's me. Good to see you again." He did a bit of a double take and then recognized me. It was a good thing he was saying nice things about me and the church, or it could have been a very uncomfortable situation. But the truth was that he was so distracted by his own worry and fear, he really did not see me even though he was looking right at me when he talked about the minister of his mom's church.

The same was true for two believers as they were traveling on the way to Emmaus. They did not recognize that the stranger in their midst was the one they had been talking about. And so when Jesus says, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" I would imagine that he might have found it a bit amusing. Yet, there is much more to this story than them not recognizing Jesus.

For me the incredible message for us is that

Jesus is there, ALWAYS

even when we least expect it,

even when we are not looking for him,

or even when we take it for granted that he promises to ALWAYS be there for us in EVERY situation

That is the incredible message of the day of Resurrection...

Jesus returns from the dead and meets his disciples in different places:

the garden,

the Emmaus Road,

the seashore,

the Upper Room.

He witnesses to them that he is alive,

He will be present with them,

Present with us-ALWAYS...

He isn't content to send them a postcard from heaven:

"HAVING A GREAT TIME. WISH YOU WERE HERE."

No!! He shows up.



As Charles Hoffacker in the book *A Guy With Body* writes:

"He shows up among them as his own witness. And he recruits as witnesses those other people with bodies. He wants them to move out and tell everyone who will listen, and everyone who won't, that bodies count; that he's back from the dead with a body, threatening them with life. Those who recognize his witness become witnesses themselves. They put their bodies on the line. They become contagious with the forgiveness they've caught, carriers of resurrection."

Hoffacker continues... "That's what this back-to-life Jesus wants of us:

not names on a list, or what someone has called 'pew potatoes.' Jesus wants us as witnesses. Not airy spirits or pious ghosts, but bodies like his own with wounds to show, bodies that witness to resurrection, threatening the world with life."

Is Posting a Prayer List an Invasion of Privacy?

An article from the Insurance Board newsletter *The Steward*.

Q: Some churches post "prayer lists" on their website that describe the prayer needs of members. Needs may include medical diagnoses, relational or financial problems. Does posting this information on a church website constitute invasion of privacy?

A: Possibly. A church can reduce if not eliminate this risk by obtaining consent from people before putting their names on a list. This can be done either by contacting persons directly and obtaining their written consent to having their name (and need) posted on the website prayer list or by instructing members to include this written consent at the time the prayer request is submitted if they desire for it to be shared publicly online.

Some churches seek to avoid the inconvenience of obtaining the consent of every person on a prayer list by creating a "no prayer list" and notifying the congregation periodically (i.e., in church bulletins or newsletters) that persons who do not want the congregation to pray for them should contact the church office and have their names placed on the "no prayer list." This "implied" consent is not as effective as the express consent obtained by contacting each person directly, and it is far from clear whether it would be deemed effective by a court.

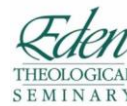

Emmaus Home Update

Emmaus

In May 2015, the Emmaus Board of Directors voted to begin transitioning clients from the Marthasville campus to the community, with a commitment to complete the move by July 2020. However, I'm thrilled to share that we are ahead of schedule and our newest projections indicate that all of our clients should be transitioned to the community by March 2019.

Currently, 49 clients remain on the Marthasville campus. Our client services team has met with them and their family members to identify where they would like to live and who they would like as their roommates. Our staff, working in conjunction with our 'angel investors,' are busy finding homes that meet the needs of our clients and families. In the next 6 months, we anticipate opening 5 new homes to serve 16 clients from the Marthasville campus.

This is a very exciting time of change and growth at Emmaus. In the past 7 months, we've opened 10 new homes, primarily in Warren County. Late last year we continued our investment in Warren County by opening our new administrative offices in Marthasville, providing fully-accessible work areas and meeting space for employees. What remains unchanged, however, is our focus on continuing the nearly 125-year tradition of providing high quality, faith-based services to people with developmental disabilities.
