The DuBois on Broadway 2.0 is now history after 13 months of planning. According to the oral comments, it was a successful special event featuring delicious food, great facilities and staff, enriching musical program, entertaining oral auction, and a wide variety of silent auction items that encouraged those final bids.

This significant fundraiser has hopefully brought more attention to DuBois Center and the many opportunities of recreation and fellowship enjoyed there by people of all ages. The proceeds from the tickets, auctions, and donations are designated for major physical equipment replacement (i.e. commercial appliances), site improvements and more. In addition, a special collection was taken to purchase a new big piece of waterfront recreational equipment, the WOW (Wonder on Water) offering.

This 2nd production of a Broadway musical revue was truly reflective of MANY people working in respective volunteer areas that showed TEAMWORK! Over 50 volunteers, 21 oral auction items, 94 silent auction entries (all donated by generous donors), attendees purchasing \$50 tickets, and all the WOW donations resulted in a memorable event benefiting DuBois Center. Love, Love, Love

A pastor accepted a new call. The pastor was excited about the new ministry. The church was excited too, and hoped their new pastor would lead them in new directions. On the first Sunday, the pastor used John 13:34-35 as the sermon text. "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." The congregation was pleased with the pastor's first Sunday and first sermon.

The next Sunday they were surprised when their new pastor preached the exact same sermon using the exact same scripture lesson. When the pastor preached it a third time on the third Sunday, the congregation complained to the leadership. The chair of the pastor-parish relations committee went to the pastor and asked the obvious question, "Why are you preaching the same sermon every week? The pastor simply answered, "When the church starts practicing this sermon, I'll write a new one!"

Essentially all of Jesus' life, ministry, preaching, and teaching can be summed up in a one word message--love. Of course, love existed before Jesus ever walked this earth. It was out of love that God created humanity. Out of love, God desired a relationship with humanity. Out of love, God sent Jesus to remind us how to live fully in that love and love one another. Jesus was love incarnate.

All of Jesus' teachings can be summarized in his instruction to the disciples found in the thirteen chapter of John, verse 34, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Why does Jesus claim this as a new command? What is new about it for us?

Jesus' command to love goes beyond the golden rule--do unto others, as you would have them do unto to you. Jesus' command raises the bar. Jesus' command raises the standard. Jesus' command demands that disciples of every time, generation, culture, and race must work to figure out how to love others as Jesus would. His extravagant love becomes the standard for every believer of every age.

Jesus also clearly explains that there is one basic identifier for how he and others will know you are a disciple. As John 13, verse 35 says, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." Did you catch it? It is one word, one way we will be identified as disciples--love. That is why we sing "And they'll know we are Christians by our love."

Yet, what puzzles me is how Christians are better known for their judgmental attitudes, quick judgments, harsh criticisms, intolerance, and even hatred. Sadly, there are many Christians that are more worried about defining for the world what they stand against instead of what they stand for by living out and expressing fully the extravagant love of Jesus.

There is a reason that the words to the song are NOT "And they'll know we are Christians by what we dislike, oppose and turn away."

Jesus' command is clear. "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." It is a message that

we in the Church still need to hear and be challenged to practice. May we so fully stand up for, live out, and express fully the extravagant love of Jesus so that everyone WILL know we are disciples by our love. Blessings, Shana

Raising Cheerful Givers WEEK 1 - Part 1 - INTRODUCTION

Today's kids will need all the help they can get to thrive financially in this world, while fully understanding the connection between faith and finance. Our children and young people are under assault with messages to spend, be greedy and grab immediate gratification wherever possible. Our culture is teaching our kids how to handle money. It is not God's way. Helping our children understand financial principles will not only help manage their money, but also become good stewards.

In these next few issues, we will look at what parents can do to help grow generous, joyful givers who will continue to impact Christ's kingdom for years to come.

Teaching our kids good financial values while they are still under our authority will give them the tools they need to do well in the real world. The goal is to establish a strategy for independence so they can handle their own finances successfully before they leave home. It will also provide a rich opportunity to share with them the important understanding that everything we have belongs to God, and we are to handle our possessions in a way that is honoring to Him.

It is important to provide our children with the proper environment to practice the discipline of handling finances, to monitor their activity so that we can maximize teachable moments, to help them set attainable goals, and finally, be sure to offer them encouragement and praise for their efforts.

Of course, teaching kids good financial values can begin at any age, but the younger we start the better. Research has found that children ages 7 and younger remember about 90 percent of what they do, but less than 10 percent of what they hear. They learn best by doing, feeling, hearing and seeing. Older children also learn best by doing, but they have the capacity to begin making personal decisions and learn from them. Teens are able to think abstractly and logically,

but are heavily influenced by peer pressure. They are beginning to integrate attitudes and behavior with the principles we have taught them. If by this time we have not taught good financial values, it is unlikely that those values will win over the values of contemporary culture.

Our kids need to learn about stewardship, and what better place to learn these lessons than at home, right here and right now.
